Dr. Gregory H. The course consisted of excursions, official visits to museums and cultural or political institutions, and discussions with eyewitnesses about aspects of German history. For the D-Term in December 2009, Dr. Wolf will offer the seminar "Holocaust, History, and the Future: Berlin and Jerusalem" which will take place in both of those cities. Dr. Wolf was also elected to the national Executive Board of the AATG representing the Midwest and will serve a three-year term.

Partner der Zukunft: die Schulinitiative

Außenminister Frank-Walter Steinmeier hat es angeregt "Schulen: Partner der Zukunft als internationale Lerngemeinschaften."

Die PASCH Initiative wird vom Auswärtigen Amt koordiniert und gemeinsam mit der Zentralstelle für das Auslandsschulwesen (ZfA), dem Goethe Institut (GI), dem Pädagogischen Austauschdienst der Kultuskonferenz (PAD) und dem Deutschen Akademischen Austausch-dienst (DAAD) umgesetzt. Es gibt drei Typen von Partnerschulen:

- **DAS**: Deutsche Auslandsschulen (von der Zentralstelle für das Auslandsschulwesen betreut)
- **DSD-Schulen**: Schulen in nationalen Bildungssystemen, die das Deutsche Sprachdiplom anbieten (von der Zentralstelle für das Auslandsschulwesen betreut)
- **GI-Schulen**: Schulen in nationalen Bildungssystemen, an denen Deutschunterricht auf- bzw. ausgebaut wird (vom Goethe-Institut betreut)

Deutsches Sprachdiplom = DSD

Was heißt eigentlich LV, HV, SK und MK? Das sind die vier Prüfungsteile, die allen DSD Prüfungen gemein sind: Lese- und Hörverstehen, schriftliche und mündliche Kommunikation. Alle vier Prüfungsteile werden gleich bewertet - 25% mit je 20 Punkten nach vorgeschriebenen Bewertungskategorien mit Gesamtpunktzahl von 80, die mit je 60% bestanden werden müssen.

Es gibt drei Stufen von diesem Sprachdiplom:

DSD A2 geprüft wird elementare Sprachverwendung in den oben genannten Kategorien, jedesmal an zwei Sonnabenden im April.

DSD B1 geprüft wird selbstständige Sprachverwendung, und

DSD C1, die weltweit im März kompetente Sprachverwendung eingehend prüft.

Die Kultusministerkonferenz (KMK) schreibt die Aufgaben vor und die Korrekturen der schriftlichen Prüfungsteile werden zentral, die der mündlichen vor Ort von den einzelnen SprachlehrerInnen nach genauen Richtlinien vorgenommen. Es gibt jetzt keine isolierten Grammatik-Teile mehr, was die immer mehr werdenden Prüflinge mit Freude begrüßen. Dieses Deutsche Sprachdiplom basiert auf dem gemeinsamen Europäischen Referenzrahmen - ERR - für Sprachen und ist ein offizielles Diplom einer deutschen Behoerde. Die DSDs werden weltweit anerkannt. Die begehrten Sprachdiplome werden den erfolgreichen Prüflingen aus Deutschland zugeschickt.

Die DANK German Language Schools in Chicago, Arlington Heights, Fox Valley und Columbus, OH haben die DSD B1 und werden die DSD A2 mit über 25 Prüflingen im April absolvieren. Wir wünschen allen Kandidaten großen Erfolg!
